John Purdie passed away March 10th after a battle with cancer.


We in the Alfa Club have known John as a racer in his 240Z and as a long time Tech "shop" for the Central Coast area.

50 YEARS AGO

An AROSC Jubilee Special

Dawning of the Age of Alfacionada

Welcome to No. 2 in a series of precious retrospectives on your Club, as gleaned from the pages of *Alfacionada* of the 1960s. This installment is from February, 1963, volume 1, number 8, the edition immmediately preceding the newsletter's name change and makeover (featured in our March edition, page 19).

In February, 1963 our charming news sheet was called The Alfa's Bark, and the lead piece was titled "Alfa Lotta Nonsense," a collection of observations by AROSC President Bob Nerell. Bob was privileged to attend a press preview of the Maserati line at Hoffman Motors and, while admiring the new 1600 Alfa, was mistaken for a Road & Track magazine staffer. His host was well into his PR presentation so Bob "...let him carry on with his discussion. At one point he states, 'You should get to know the people in the Alfa Owners Club; they're the most enthusiastic bunch in the country.' " How right this is! Love you, Bob!

Nerell continued with a note about an idea our current Board of Directors has been looking at, tangentially, for a while now: sharing membership information with our members! He writes: "Elsewhere in this issue ... [we] will have something to say concerning the proposed state-wide Alfa Owners Directory. Through Ed Gustin's contacts with the San Francisco Chapter, we have received a 'green light' ... San Diego should go along also." How about that?



As mentioned in the March installment of "50 Years", these AROSC stalwarts were also philosophical about the state of motoring and marque enthusiasm. Bob laments: "What has happened to the 'esprit d'corps' ... these days? Time was, not so very long ago, when you would get a wave, a light blink, or even a bit of a nod from other drivers. No more however, and today not even a flicker of recognition from fellow Alfa pilots."

Well, in the March '63 issue, Ed Gustin responded in "True Stories". "Suppose we should point out ... the button in the middle of the steering wheel is for GREETING OTHER ALFAS. The Italians knew ... for the tech-minded, pushing this button (1) Causes head lamp to flash on. (2) Makes amp meter violently vibrate. (3) Deposits thin film of ovl [sic] on road for cars behind to spin on. (4) Gladdens the heart and brightens the day of the greeted driver, who (a) after an initial shock (b) wonders what kind of nut that was (c) recovers (d) and waves back; causing: a GT Dodge, 2 Luh-Mahns Pontiacs and a bucket-seated, 2-on-the-dash Monza to go into the ditch."

AROSC Concorso #2 Celebrating 50 Years June 3rd, 2012 in the ALFA ROMEO CLASS at the 2012 Huntington Beach Concours

Our new Direttore di Concorsi, Jordan Lee has introduced a new single-page, simple-to-understand-and -prepare-for AROSC Concours Judging System.

1 – Procedure

a) When arriving at the Huntington Beach Concours look for the AROSC banner and follow directions for car placement.

b) When parking, you will be asked if you wish your car to be judged (classes listed below), and when you say YES, you will be asked for \$10 to defray the cost of awards and you will be given a "CLASS JUDGE'S SCOR-ING FORM" with your assigned number which will be recorded. Please fill in the pertinent information and place on your windshield. The judges will fill in your scores and leave plethora of commentary – or not.

c) Please arrive by 8:30 so you have some time to take the grass off your tires before the judging starts.

2 – Basic Rules and Guidelines

a) Cars are meant to be driven and emphasis will be on originality and authenticity.

b) If you are a judge, a great way to really appreciate nostre macchine belle, you will not be asked to judge your own car or any car with which you have had a previous affair.

3 – What is judged (Total Pt. Value 100)

a) Spiders can be judged with the top up or down (the judge needs only to make sure it is there and correct). b) Trunks will not be judged, but there will be a category called "Complementary Elements" and a Drivers/Owners Manual, First Aid Kit, Highway Safety Equipment, Fire Extinguisher, Magazine / Articles / Ad Brochures and Vehicle Specific Memorabilia can add up to 5 points.

c) The judge will ask you for a little information about the car and explain the sequence of the judging which will start with a walk around the car. At various times the judge will ask you to open things, start the engine, turn on your headlights (low and hi beam), parking lights, back up lights and directional signals.

4 – Classes

a) A very special class for cars as old or older than AROSC: Pre-1962 Open, Pre-1962 Closed

b) Spiders

c) Closed Coupes, and Sedans

d) Track Competition Vehicles – Time Trial and Race Prepared.

e) Daily Drivers – Vehicles used more than a two days a week for commuting or as your primary vehicle.

5 – Awards

a) There are points awarded for First, Second and Third Place that will count toward the Year-End Overall Competition Championship.

b) Regardless of the number of people in a class, there will be a physical award presented to First, Second and Third place.

Two Days in the Life of a Rookie Driving School Instructor by Mike McKibbin

At the January Willow Springs event, a call went out to all instructors for a meeting about our upcoming Driving School, set for February 18-19 at the Streets of Willow. I had done some driver education at primary events on race and TT weekends, so when Steve Hamilton passed by and pointed at me, saying, "Come on," and asked if I was interested in becoming a full-time instructor at the AROSC school, I was flattered. Of course! What a privilege!

I was assigned to the highperformance street driving class, traditionally the largest group; with 18 cars this was the case at the February school. There were many instructors for this group, so my being a rookie was not terribly intimidating, but actually quite a learning experience. I had never sat through the street performance course, and was genuinely enlightened by the detailed explanation of driving techniques I'd been taking for granted.

Daughter Andrea was signed up in race group and exhibiting some newly-found aggression. Terry Watson told me that during one of the practices, he came up from behind her and thought, "Oh, it's Andrea. I'll just drive around her," and then she

My sister-in-law, Kyong, drove brother Mitch's Mazda in street performance, and went from being somewhat timid on Saturday morning to being to toss the car around on Sunday. We all cheered for her as she spun the car out on the go-kart track and appeared to be thoroughly enjoying herself.

My own shining moments came Sunday morning when I decided to grace Francisco Duran, driving Joe

Cobb's Mustang, with my expertise. I rode with him as a passenger for a few laps and decided he needed a little guidance on entry points, lines and exits, so I told him, "Let me show you how it's done." I got behind the wheel and gave him a running narrative as we proceeded around the race track and, as we approached the chicane, I locked up both front brakes. Without missing a beat, I explained that this is something you do not want to do. We took another lap and just to make sure the lesson was not lost, I locked up the front brakes again coming into the chicane. Again, without missing a beat, I helpfully explained, while knocking a cone out of the way, that it is pretty much impossible to steer the

Despite the wheel-to-wheel dicing everywhere, there was no contact whatsoever.




