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The Tech Guy ... *The 123s and ABCs of Tires, Part 1*

Just like everything else, tires have gotten a lot more complex over the years, not just in what they can do, but even in what you have to know to buy them.

Back when I was a youngster, all you had to know was the tire size and whether you wanted whitewalls or blackwalls. In the United States prior to 1970 the tire size was given as the width and the rim diameter, both sizes in inches, with sizes such as 6.00 x 16, stock tire on a 1949 Ford, or 5.20 x 10 for a Morris Mini. These were all bias-ply tires with an aspect ratio (ratio of width to height) of .90 (standard) or .80 (low profile). The 6.00 x 16 tire for the Ford with an aspect ratio of .90 would be 6.00 inches wide and 5.40 inches from the bead to the tread.

In about 1970, at the urging of the government, the U.S. went to an alphanumeric designation, using a letter (the load rating), a two-digit aspect ratio, and the rim size. Common tire sizes were anywhere from an A78-13 to an L50-15. These were also bias-ply tires. When radials were introduced, they added a letter R after the load rating to denote radial-ply (e.g., FR60-15). This was to insure that the tire could handle the weight of the car and would not fail in use. The tire used for a car had to be able to handle at least $\frac{1}{4}$ of the weight of the car. There was no direct relationship between the load rating and a particular tire's width; however, the higher load-rating tires were generally wider with a smaller aspect ratio

number. When you replaced your tires, you just got the same size as the manufacturer put on the car, or you could go to a different aspect ratio to enhance the car's looks.

In the late '70s the United States went to a metric tire size designation, similar to what Europe was using, but of course with some differences. This designation was known as P-metric. A letter designation was added to the front of the tire size to denote its use, P for passenger cars and LT for light trucks. Typical sizes were P155/80R13 or P185/75R14. Aspect ratios went anywhere from 80 down to 30. So now you had to know two measurement systems and also what aspect ratio you wanted.

Now you know what those tire size numbers mean and where they came from. But these aren't the only pieces of important information that you need to know about. The U.S. Department of Transportation has come up with additional information on the tire, the Uniform Tire Quality Grade (UTQG). This marking indicates the tread wear, traction and temperature ratings of the tire. Tread wear rating gives an indication of the tread life with a rating of 100 being a "normal" tire and 300 being a "long life" tire. The numbers do not indicate the actual miles of tread life and are only a tool for comparison, kind of like EPA mileage ratings. The other two numbers are actual ratings. The traction rating can be C, B, A or AA, with AA being the best. They relate to the breaking g-force of the tires. The

third rating, temperature, corresponds roughly to the earlier European speed rating. A rating of C can handle sustained speed of 85 to 100 mph. A rating of B can operate between 100 and 115 mph and a rating of A is for over 115 mph.



Our AROSC Concorso is taking place Sunday, June 2, in conjunction with the 28th annual Huntington Beach Concours d'Elegance. The Concours has its home on the picturesque lawns of Central Park in Huntington Beach, adjacent to the Huntington Beach Public Library & Cultural Resource Center, at Talbert and Goldenwest streets.

The HB event itself takes place over both Saturday, June 1, and Sunday. Saturday is a Hot Rod and Custom Car Show while Sunday is the open Concours. AROSC will have its own Corral area on Sunday. If you plan to exhibit a car, entry is required by May 27th and costs \$35. Entry forms are available at www.hbconcours.org.

Keep in mind that the AROSC Concorso is separate from the HB Concours. HB has its own judges and you may win prizes from both of the events.

Taking into consideration critiques and suggestions by AROSC members, procedures and scoring have been

updated:

1. All cars will receive .5 point for every year older than 1990. This will level the field between unrestored, well-maintained original cars and restored cars.
2. When entering the Corral, you will receive a short form to fill out and leave on the windshield of your car.
3. Classes will be Open, Closed, Daily Driver and Competition (Race &/or Time Trial), but HB has many more choices for classes (and Mothers gives out buckets of prizes).

Our 2013 privately docented tour courtesy of Norm Silverman and Gene Brown was another unique peek at automotive innovation, style and engineering that few ever get to see.

We gathered on the rooftop under brilliant March skies, swept clear by a fresh breeze. About 25 Alfas were arrayed in our own special parking area while we enjoyed coffee and Danish before splitting into Vault Tour, Gene-Led Tour and Norm-Led Tour groups.

As part of the Petersen's overarching themed 2012-2013 "Aerodynamics: from Art to Science" exhibition, the "Fins, Form Without Function" display was great fun, showing us 20+ cars from the early '50s through the middle '60s, whose embellishments were imagined and executed by a variety of engineers, designers and enthusiasts. Examples of Detroit's finest, Cadillac, Buick and Chrysler, were on view, as well as customs from garages all over the U.S.

We also toured the rooms dedicated to the 19 cars displayed as aero studies, a wonderful assortment from a

1928 Martin Aerodynamic to a 2006 Bugatti Veyron, that included a 1938 Tatra and a 1969 Dodge Charger Daytona. It was illuminating to read the exhibit brochure, operate the interactive coefficient of drag display and contrast that to what we learned about the tailfins, which in no way contributed to the aerodynamics of the vehicles they adorned.

We all met downstairs on the Johnny Rockets patio for a cool, breezy lunch while Mike presided over the March General Meeting. Spring Tour '11 pal, newly elected AROC national board member and Kearney Mesa Fiat principal Sean Russell joined us, and pledged ample representation for Southern California. Thanks to our San Diego Chapter friends who made the drive up to join us for this special day.

On the way out, it was time to shop the museum store and there was a bit of something for everyone to be sampled.

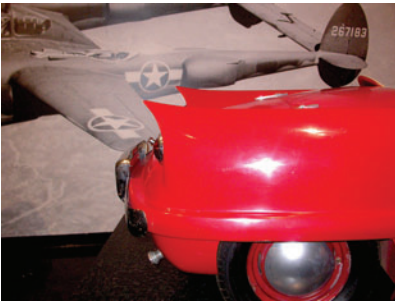

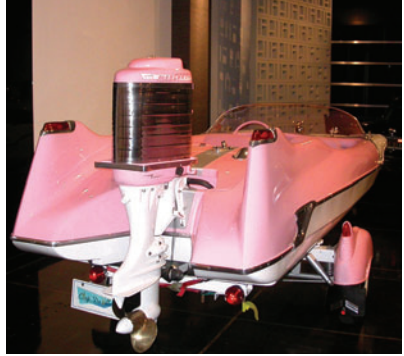

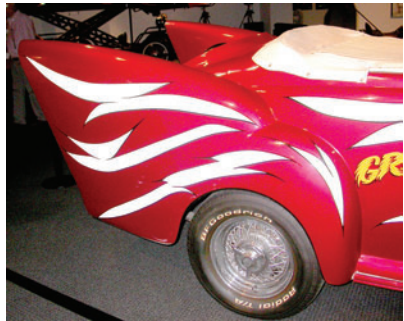

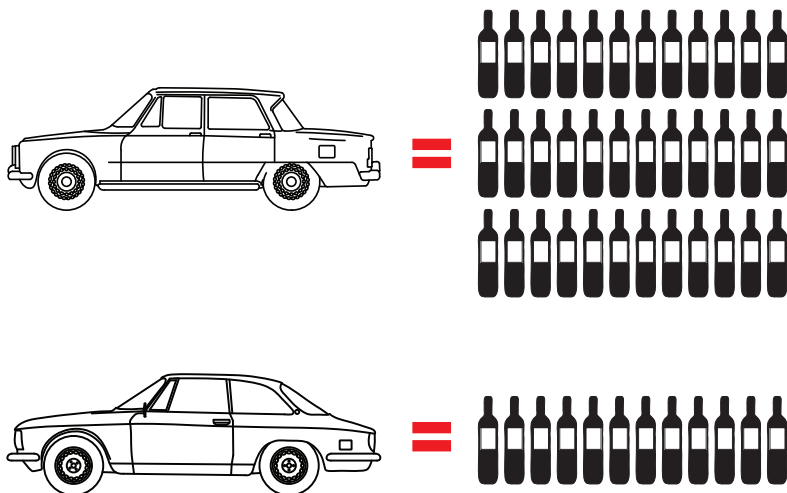
