This year's array of garage goodies, art, artifacts and otherwise sale-proof Alfa parts





















It was a simple question: Where have all the Orange County orchards gone, long time passing? The answer was pretty simple too: Gone to housing (and light industry), everyone. But we thought absorbing a little nostalgia and history would be a fun way to exercise our Alfas on a summer's day.

Turns out there are some orchards left and we viewed four of them: the tiny private Sexlinger grove (15 trees) in Santa Ana; a big public tribute to the region's namesake commodity, Tustin Citrus Ranch Park (16 acres); the Nisson family's organic Valencia orchard and fruit stand in Tustin, and the 100-year-old Pessel grove in Anaheim. We

linked them together with some fun little roads for a civilized 36-mile drive concluding at a former Sunkist packing house for lunch, The Anaheim Packing House.

Fourteen cars and 24 club members made the three-hour tour. We had four Giulias, three Spiders, an Alfetta and a GTV-6, a 4C, 2000 Touring, an admirable Nissan people-mover, BMW Z4 and a Porsche 911. Stylish and sporty.
